Topic: An innovative investigation into interprofessional online learning experience of nurses and allied health care professionals.

Abstract: Information on student online learning experience from a student perspective is considered by many educational researchers as an invaluable indicator of the effectiveness of online modules or programmes. Current research methods to gather the information are commonly based on either a phenomenological or an ethnographic approach. In research studies which focus on the interprofessional online learning (IPOL) experience in an asynchronous text-based learning environment involving nurses and allied healthcare professionals, Fairclough's version of critical discourse analysis (CDA) offers researchers an alternative but important research approach. Fairclough's CDA not only establishes the IPOL experience from a student perspective, but crucially, it does so through a critical lens within an authentic learning environment.

The purpose of this paper is to justify the use of Fairclough's CDA in investigating IPOL experience in healthcare education, it is also to demonstrate how information about IPOL which are not captured in existing approaches, may be observed using CDA. It exemplifies the importance of research work which sets out to determine the effectiveness of IPOL from a student's perspective to start focusing on culture and social relations.
